The President's Message

If you grew up in the 1970s like I did, you may recall Bob on Sesame Street singing the "Neighborhood Song". Bob always started the song by asking the all-important question "Oh, who are the people in your neighborhood?". Though the types of people (grocer, baker, policeman, doctor, etc.) introduced changed from verse to verse, you always knew Bob would end the song with this refrain:



"They're the people that you meet
When you're walking down the street
They're the people that you meet eeeeeaaaaach daaaaaaaay!"

Sesame Street taught me more than my ABCs and how to count; it was an important model for friendship and the importance of community. Though the fictional Sesame Street was much smaller than my childhood subdivision in Ferndale, WA, and obviously miniscule in comparison to Newport Hills, the message about community remains the same: Who ARE the people in your neighborhood? Have you made the time to get to know them?

In June 1992 my sister and I were hospitalized at the same time with separate motor vehicle accidents. Imagine a small army of neighbors from our cul-de-sac banding together to take care of my family: sending flowers and cards, visiting in the hospital, providing meals for two weeks upon our return home. We'd known some neighbors for nineteen years and some neighbors we'd known just a short time. The important thing was this: we knew them. We'd taken the time to find out "who the people in (our) neighborhood" were and in return they wrapped my family in a warm blanket of support when we needed it.

Support came in many other forms throughout the years. Neighbors Jim and Larry were our unofficial Block Watch. Mothers formed walking groups and fathers helped with each other's home maintenance projects or car repairs. About 15-20 kids of various ages played together. My sister and I escorted our younger neighbors to the bus stop each morning and also served as their babysitters. Our neighborhood wasn't homogenous; there were several differences in family size, education, marital and socioeconomic status, religious beliefs, etc. Our commonality was our shared sense of community. My neighbors from the Flair development and Tamarac Place remain very important to me: they are my memory keepers and represent some of the best times of my life.

I've lived in Newport Hills for 12 years. At times I've felt a bit lost in such a large neighborhood. Making the effort to meet my neighbors over the past three years has made a huge difference for me- I'm part of a community again! We watch out for each other's homes and pets, lend equipment and assist with household tasks, attend social gatherings, celebrate the births of new little neighbors, and comfort each other during dark times. I could not have been elected NHCC Vice President last July without the support of my neighbors. My involvement with the NHCC has only further enriched my life.

"Community starts at the block level" is the theme for my term as NHCC President. The relationships we form at the individual block level and in each area are the foundation upon which the greater Newport Hills community is built. So in 2013 I request that each one of you ask yourself "Who ARE the people in my neighborhood?" ... and then make the effort to find out.

Grab the kids and a basket and join your neighbors for the annual Spring Egg Hunt at Newport Hills Elementary School. There are four separate egg hunts for children 1-10. The hunt begins with the youngest children at 9:00 AM sharp – followed by the other three age groups, so all children will have some fun. A real live Bunny (about the size of a person!) always shows up to make it special for children of all ages. Great time for family pictures.

Coal Creek Parkway Culvert Replacement

Background. Coal Creek Parkway carries nearly 28,000 cars a day, is an important route for Bellevue and regional commuters and provides a corridor for a



number of utilities. Ensuring it is a safe and reliable transportation route is a priority for the city. The culvert under the street near Southeast 60th Street -- essentially a nine-foot wide corrugated metal pipe that is

a conduit for Coal Creek -- is deteriorating and at risk for failure during heavy rains. Over its lifespan, the culvert has been exposed to numerous heavy storms and has been corroded, scoured and undermined by high flows.

The city has conducted a number of short-term repairs to the culvert, which have extended its lifespan. However, engineering analysis of the culvert indicates that continued short-term repairs are no longer viable. As a result, Utilities has designed a long-term solution, a 39-foot-long bridge over the stream.

The project will include:

- Pedestrian pathway underneath the parkway that connects to the Coal Creek Trail, which will improve pedestrian safety;
- Creek restoration upstream, downstream and under the new bridge; and
- Relocation of above- and below-ground utilities.

The project will be constructed in two phases ([timeline](#)). During each phase, Coal Creek Parkway will be reduced to one lane in each direction through the project area, between just south of Forest Drive and just north of Southeast 60th Street.

During the first phase, April to November 2013, construction crews will close both southbound lanes and convert one northbound lane to a southbound lane to provide one lane in each direction. Crews will build the west half of the bridge and relocate underground utilities.

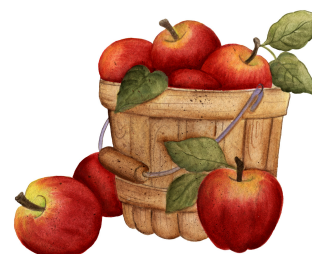
During Phase Two, crews will close both northbound lanes and reconfigure the southbound lanes to one lane in each direction. Crews will build the east half of the new bridge and will complete the project by the end of November 2014.

Both lanes are planned to be open in each direction for about four months between each phase to help ease congestion.

While it's impossible to avoid impacts during a project of this nature, construction of the new bridge will be done in a way that reduces impacts to the traveling public and the community. We are getting the word out early so people know what to expect and can plan accordingly. You can stay informed by:

Orchard Gardens

Our Neighborhood P-Patch in the Heart of Factoria

Last year we built an herb garden. This area which welcomes gardeners at the top of the P-Patch went from a dumpy space to a beautiful, relaxing place to sit and enjoy the sights, scents and sounds of a thriving garden. Kiwis, apples and flowers twine around the gate and a brick fountain provides a focal point from which to view the Olympics on a clear day.

We shared our bounty once again this past season, donating 1,600 pounds of fresh vegetables to [Hopelink](#). We also welcomed four new gardeners, Lijun, Becca Alfonso and Melissa!

Next door to the P-Patch on the Holy Cross Lutheran Church (HCLC) grounds, an orchard composed of apple, pear and plum trees thrives again. There are also walnuts and hazelnut trees. The orchard predates the church and is well over 50 years old.

There are several varieties of apples in the orchard: Winesap, Ben Davis, Baldwin, Esopus Spitzenburg, Duchess of Oldenburg, Opalescent, Winter Banana, Transparent. The Transparents come and go in the early

weeks of summer. Originally when we started taking care of the orchard in 2010, we thought that the names of the apples had been lost to time, but the Earthkeeping team at HCLC was fortunate enough to have had the help of the Seattle Tree Fruit society in identifying the varieties of apples. In our orchard, we have 17 apple trees 6 plum trees, 5 quince, and 3 pear trees. There is also a walnut and a hazelnut tree.

All of these varieties were once popular varieties of apples. Transparents were brought over from Europe and were widely grown there because of their early ripening. Winter bananas grow well in the Northwest and were prized for their beautiful yellow color. The Holy Cross Earthkeeping team together with the community have been harvesting the fruit for local food bank. To give you an idea of what the orchard can produce, here are the numbers from 2012 along with the harvest dates.

7/28 – 300 lbs. yellow transparents
8/4 – 100 lbs. yellow transparents
8/11 – 10 lbs. winesap, 5 lbs. Italian plums
8/25 – 200 lbs. misc. apples & plums
9/8 – 300 lbs. apples, pears, plums
9/22 – 80 lbs. misc. apples
10/6 – 60 lbs. apples – made 30 gals of apple cider, 50 lbs. of quince sold to local restaurants
10/20 – 100 lbs. of quince sold to local restaurants
Total fruit without quince = 1055 – 1/2 ton!

Neighborhood Leadership Gathering *Robin Bentley*

A gathering of neighborhood leaders welcomed the City of Bellevue's newly hired Neighborhood and Community Outreach Manager Mike McCormick Huentelman. Mayor Conrad Lee and Councilmembers Claudia Balducci and John Stokes also spoke.

In listening to residents from around the City, we learned that every neighborhood is unique, and nearly every neighborhood has concerns. For example, West Sammamish Parkway is undergoing major roadwork. Lake Bellevue is threatened by runoff contaminated by nearby Overlake District development. And of course Enatai and Surrey Downs neighbors feel threatened by the arrival of the Eastlink Light Rail line. Mr. Huentelman himself pointed out the example of the imminent Coal Creek culvert project as having a big impact on Newport Hills neighbors. Yet, we're far more powerful in influencing City Hall if we work together and speak up frequently.

This year, Neighborhood Outreach will revitalize the Neighborhood Match program to leverage community collaboration and provide small matching grants for neighborhood projects.

Neighborhood forums will provide platforms to deepen neighborhood conversations about the issues that matter most, including topics such as keeping kids safe in our community and responding to climate change.

"It Takes a Community to Care" will be held at 7pm, Thursday, April 18, at Crossroads Community Center. Join the national conversation on community and school safety. Local panelists include police, school and mental health specialists sharing their expertise on the web of support available in our community.

NH Residents Recognized

Congratulations to Newport Hills residents Steve Walker and Dallas Graham, 2013 recipients of the President's Call to Service Award. Membership: The NHCC Needs YOUR Help!

FACT: The NHCC serves over 2,800 homes.

FACT: The 2012-2013 budget was based on a goal of 625 household memberships. However, only 333 households have paid their dues as of February 19.

FACT: Membership dues are only \$10 per household per year.

FACT: Membership dues pay for community services and events such as the newsletter, Spring Egg Hunt, 4th of July Children’s Parade and Picnic, Community Faire, Holiday Bazaar, and Santa Tour.

FACT: 2013 community events are in jeopardy without more households committing to pay membership dues.

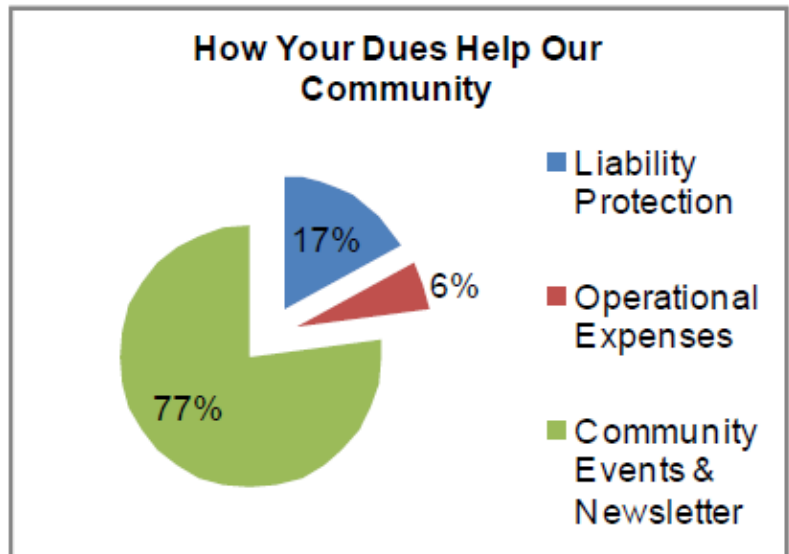
